

WHAT HAPPENED TO MANAIGRE?

The rest of the story...

When Cody Steele of North Dakota came for a tour, we discovered that his ancestors, Louis and Margaret Manaigre (Manaige), lived at Portage (likely on this historic site) in the 1830s. They are described in Juliette Kinzie's memoir, Wau-Bun.

The Indian agency blacksmith boarded with Louis and Margaret until appx. 1832-33. Louis helped build the blacksmith's home which served as the temporary agency house prior to the surviving structure's construction in 1832. Juliette Kinzie taught the older Manaigre children, Peter and Josette, at her Sunday school in which she endeavored to educate her servant and the area's Métis children. The family remained at Portage during the Black Hawk War while many others fled.

According to information uploaded to WikiTree, Louis' parents were Canadians, while Margaret was a daughter of Portage's Perriche Grignon and Es-chah-waukah Decorah (Ho-Chunk chief Glory in the Morning's granddaughter). Louis and Margaret's son, Peter, is documented living in each of the Ho-Chunk reservations up through the Blue Earth era. His sister Josette's children were also at Blue Earth

in 1857. Louis, himself, was recorded as being a baker at Blue Earth reservation in 1857 and stayed in this area until his death. Similar to Tomah Mirandeau who was featured in our July 2024 newsletter (www.agencyhouse.org/news), many within the Manaigre family apparently chose to accompany the Ho-Chunk side of the family through the hardships of their expulsions.

Cody's family ended up in North Dakota where he still resides. We were honored to meet this descendant of a family which had a unique place in our site's history. Read more about the Manaigre family in Wau-Bun chapters 26, 27, 28, 32, and 34.

As the NSCDA-WI fades off the scene, their top priority has been to ensure that the results of their nearcentury of steadfast care of our historic site reverberates into the future.



The National Society of the

Colonial Dames of America in the State of Wisconsin was established in 1896 to actively promote our national heritage through historic preservation, patriotic service, and educational projects. Its membership was limited to direct descendants of colonists who lived in America and rendered public service to the colonies prior to July 5, 1776. The Wisconsin chapter has been a powerhouse of service over its 128 years of existence, making a real and lasting impact — particularly when it committed to rescuing and restoring the Agency House during the Great Depression. These women poured themselves into this endeavor, opening the home as a museum in 1932 and overseeing its operation up to the present day. Theirs is a fascinating story with a noteworthy legacy.

With declining membership and decreasing capacity of the older generation to actively serve in leadership, the difficult decision was made to disband and plan for the independent future of the museum. Our site does, however, retain an informal partnership with the national Dames umbrella organization through its Great American Treasures initiative. We are deeply grateful for the foresight and dedication of multiple generations of the NSCDA-WI!


